Doing More for Hungry Neighbors

According to official estimates, more than 13,000 children, women, and men are living in poverty across Porter County. Nearly 5,400 are in Portage.

With poverty so often leading to food insecurity, it's critical for the Food Bank of Northwest Indiana to continue to expand its service to pantry locations and feeding sites across these communities.

Thanks to your generosity, one site we've served for years is the Iglesia Evangelica De Cristo MI



Church Food Pantry in Portage. There, Pastor Rev. Israel Santiago and his wife Almarys, along with volunteers from their own congregation and other area churches, welcome families in need during their monthly food distribution out of the their church Hall.

"We are a small church. We don't get any outside donations. We have no sponsors or other resources. We thank God for the donations that come within our Church. The Food Bank of Northwest Indiana supplies most of our food. We used to buy all nonperishable foods on our own, and that got too expensive as more people came. Asking grocery



stores and bakeries for donations was a lot of legwork, so we became a partner of the Food Bank. We try to purchase all of our nonperishable and perishable items through them. When we started 15 years ago, we started helping approximately 10 families. Now we serve over 100."

Pastor Israel's church is one among more than a dozen Porter County pantries and feeding sites served by your gifts to the Food Bank.

"When people think about hunger and poverty in the Region, they might more naturally picture communities in Gary and East Chicago, which rank #1 and #2 in impoverished towns in Indiana," says Food Bank Executive Director Steve Beekman. "But families all over are struggling, and it's our job to provide good, nutritious food to everyone who needs it."

Pastor Israel sees it first hand. "People start lining up at 6 am. It doesn't matter that they wait four hours. I couldn't do it ... when it's cold I try to open up the church so they can come inside. We don't turn anyone away, and when large families come in, I try to give them a little extra if there's enough."

Food Bank Exceeds All Previous Years' Number of Meals Served

Thanks to the increasing generosity of so many kind neighbors and renewing donors, 2017 saw more meals delivered out of the Food Bank of Northwest Indiana's small barn warehouse and headquarters than in any previous year since its founding in 1982.

But the **record-breaking 4.5 million meals served** (approximately 5,434,000 pounds of food) was a bittersweet accomplishment.

Hunger breaks our heart. I know it breaks yours, too.

But what choice do we have? Picture the child sitting in school right now with an empty stomach ... watching the clock tick closer to lunchtime so she can have her first meal of the day, and already worrying whether there will be any food at home for supper. It's hard to pay attention to anything else when you're hungry.

It's for her, and the more than 100,000 people going hungry across the Region, that we must keep going, together. We must do more to feed the children, families, and individuals struggling to get by, while also working in more ways to address and eliminate the many complex causes of hunger in our Region.

As 2018 continues, we'll be sharing some ways that the Food Bank will be expanding its efforts to do just that. I thank you again for joining hands and hearts with us to deliver more food, hope, and the help people need to thrive.
